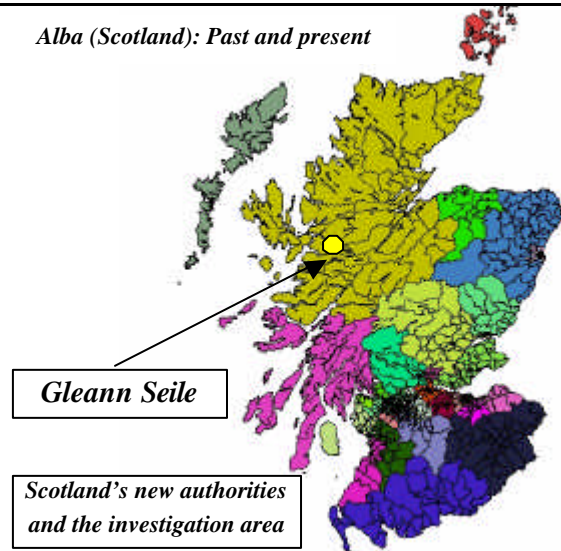

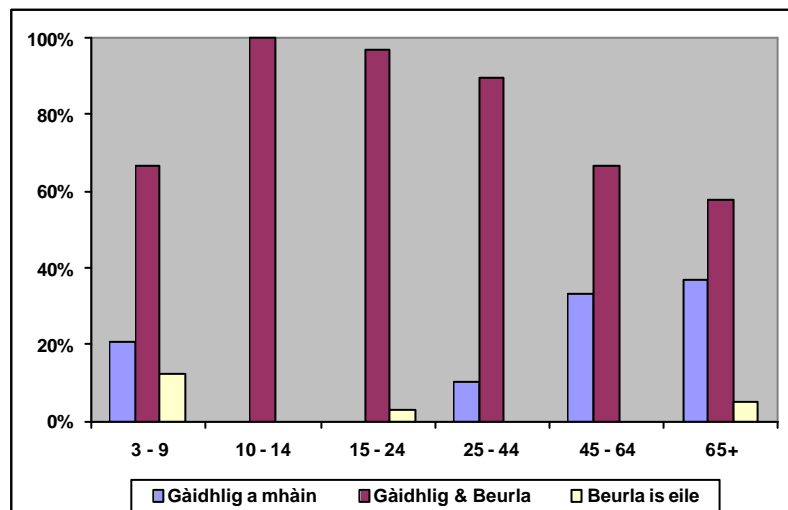


### State of Gàidhlig in 1891:

Almost all residents spoke Gàidhlig irrespective of their place of birth. One in six of Gàidhlig speakers was still monolingual. Men were more likely to speak also English than women.

### Area description:

The district is situated at the west-coast of the Highlands and incorporates the townships between *Inbhir Seile* and *Innis a'Chrò* at the head of *Loch Dhubhthaich* (Loch Duich) as well as the vast mountain area around *Gleann Seile* (Glenshiel) and *Gleann Loinne* (Glen Loyne). Besides a few crofters and sheep farming managers people were mostly engaged as shepherds and gamekeepers.

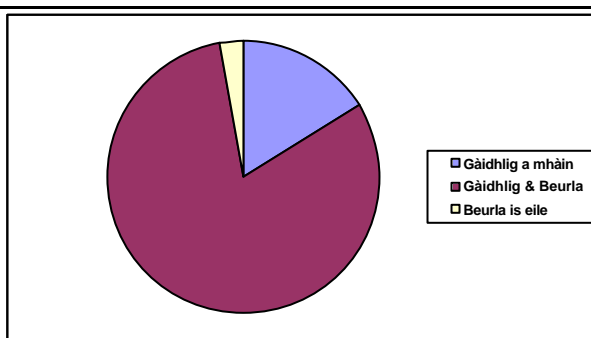

## Background of Gàidhlig (Scottish Gaelic) Local Profiles:

The 1891 census was the first such enumeration exercise with an unequivocal language question. After more than 100 years the original census forms are publicly available for detailed analysis. During research concerned with the "Gàidhlig (Scottish Gaelic) Local Studies" a vast number of such local statistics have been gathered about the Gàidhlig speaking population of Scotland in that year. As many of these results could not be included in the reports these concise fact-sheets are a welcome way to publish some of the "local gems". 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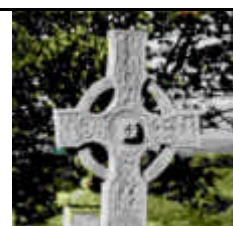

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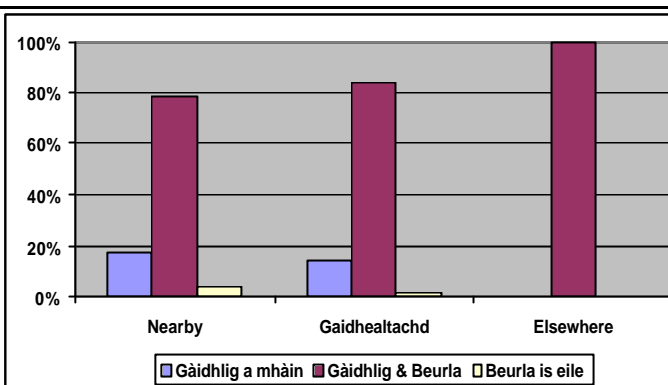
## Place of birth and Gàidhlig speaking:

The ability to speak Gàidhlig was almost universal and not dependent on the place of birth. Those who did not speak English, however, were born in the *Gaidhealtachd*.

## Remarks:

1. There were five female persons in the usually resident population who were reported as not speaking Gàidhlig. Among these was of course the public school teacher from Creich in Sutherland. The remaining residents with no “G&E” or “G” marks on their registration sheets were a 70 year crofter’s wife and three young girls aged between 3 and 6. Whether these census returns were really unable to speak the local language, however, remains doubtful. More probably they were usually not speaking Gàidhlig but could do so.
2. In original census report terms the whole community in total had a population of 218 persons of all ages. 162 enumerated inhabitants spoke “Gaelic and English” and 29 persons were reported as monolingual Gàidhlig speakers. These figures lead to an “official” share of Gàidhlig speakers of 88.0 %. A comparison with the more realistic statistics of this fact-sheet reveals that this percentage was a significant under-estimate of 9.2 % caused by the inclusion of under-three olds and visitors in the official population base.
